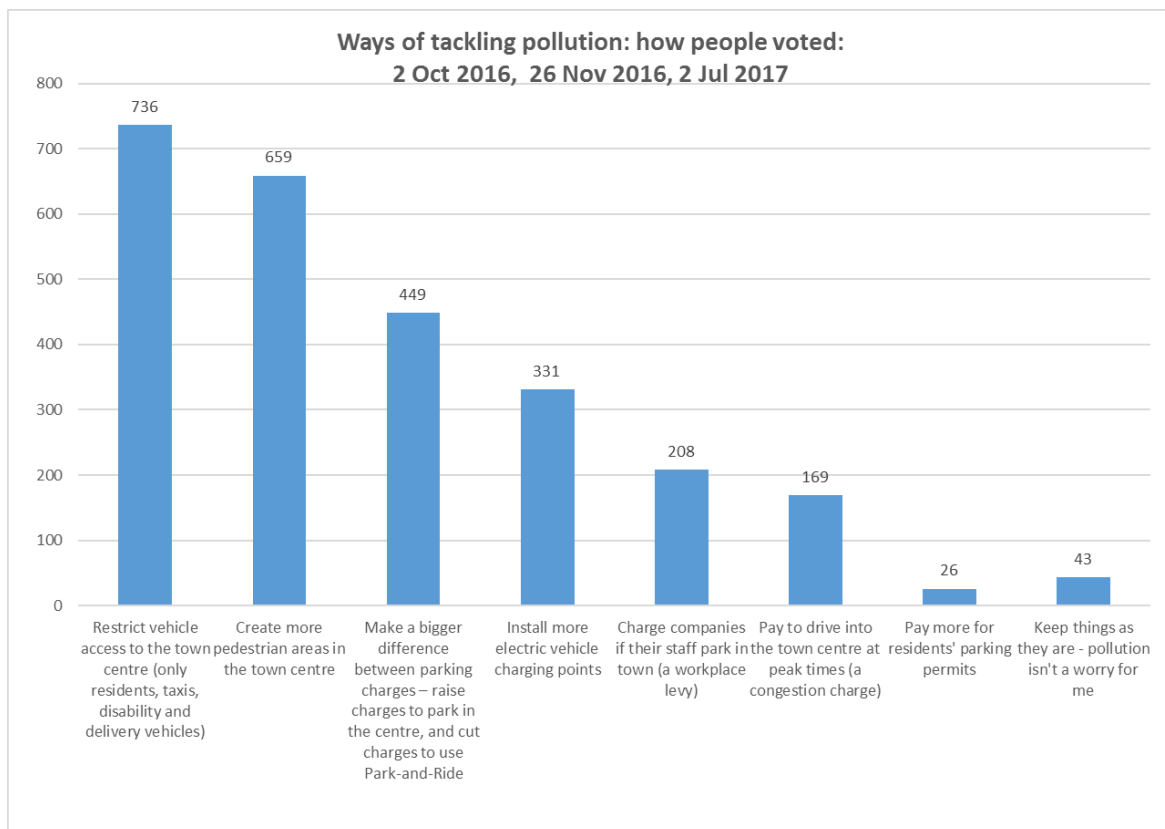

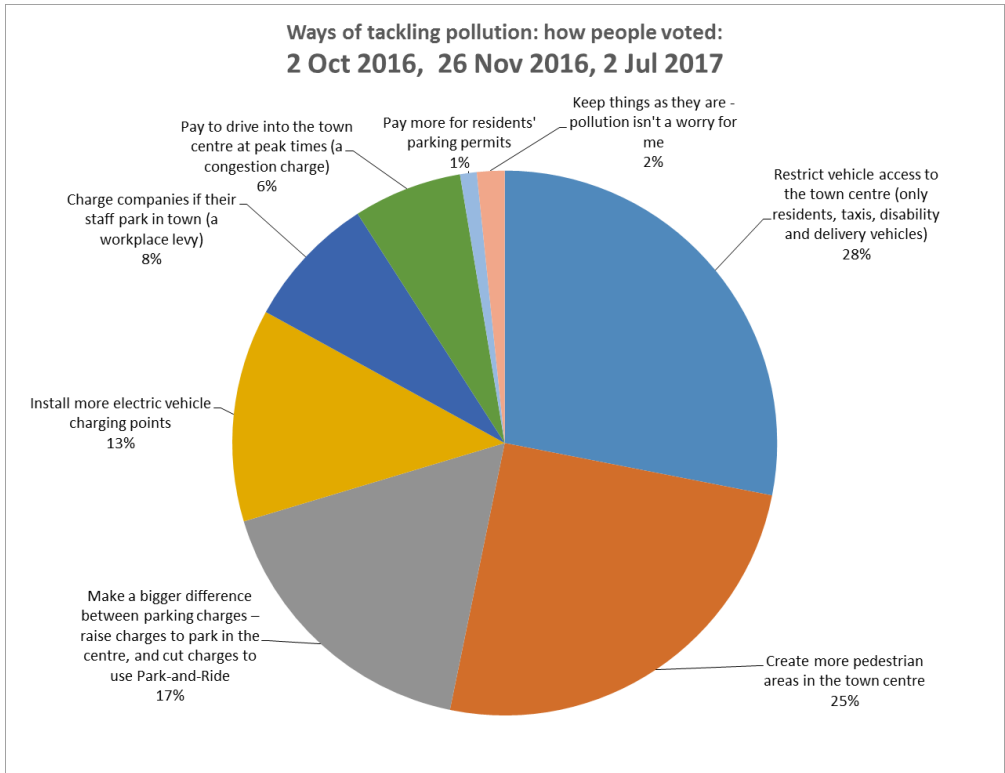
Results

Three polls were carried out on quite different occasions: Cathedral harvest weekend, pre-Christmas Saturday high street shopping, and Hat Fair. 1310 people took part. Each had two “votes”.

The results are a good indicator of how people feel, and are compatible with the street survey carried out as part of the Miracles project in 2005. The results on all three occasions follow the same pattern very closely. They reveal high levels of concern and are a solid basis for action.

Only about 2% of votes were for doing nothing. Over 50% of the votes were cast for the complementary measures of reducing traffic and increasing pedestrian areas.





Where people live and how they use Winchester does not appear to influence how they vote.

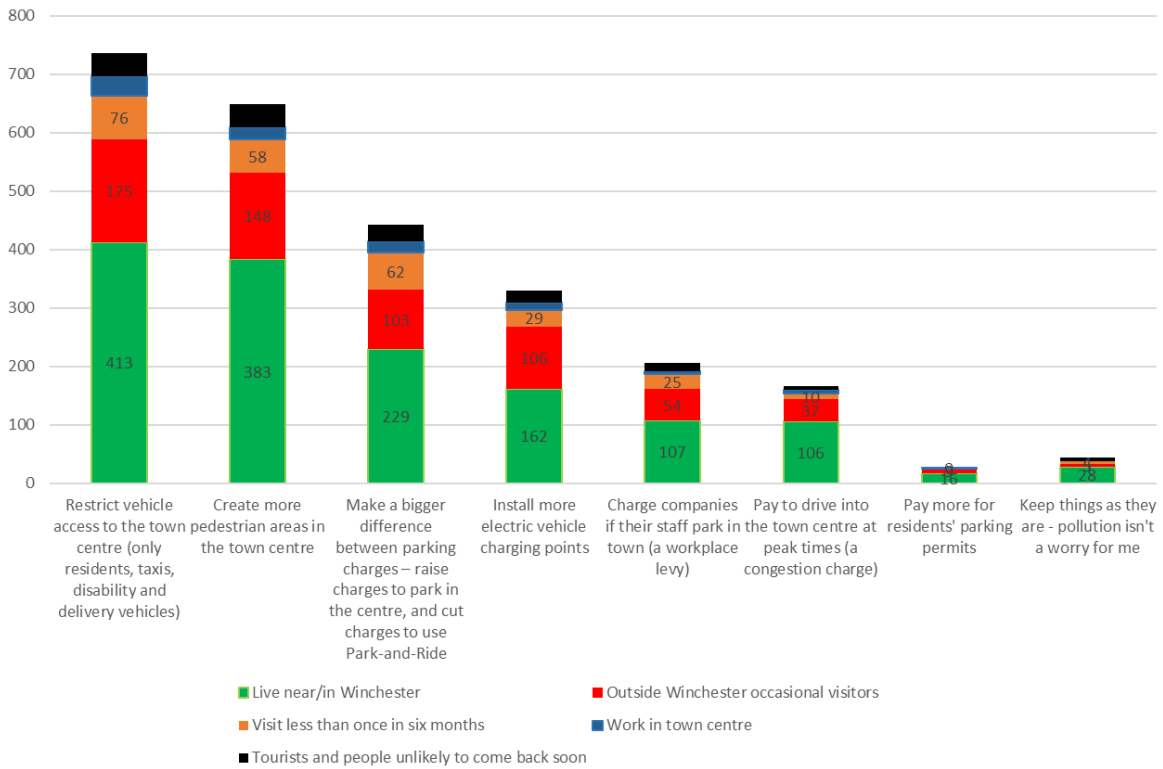
There is no truth in the suggestion that people who live outside Winchester want to keep high levels of traffic in central Winchester, even though people who live in Winchester want to reduce it.

All groups want traffic reduction and more pedestrianisation.

People from outside Winchester, and people who work in Winchester are the groups least interested in keeping things the same.

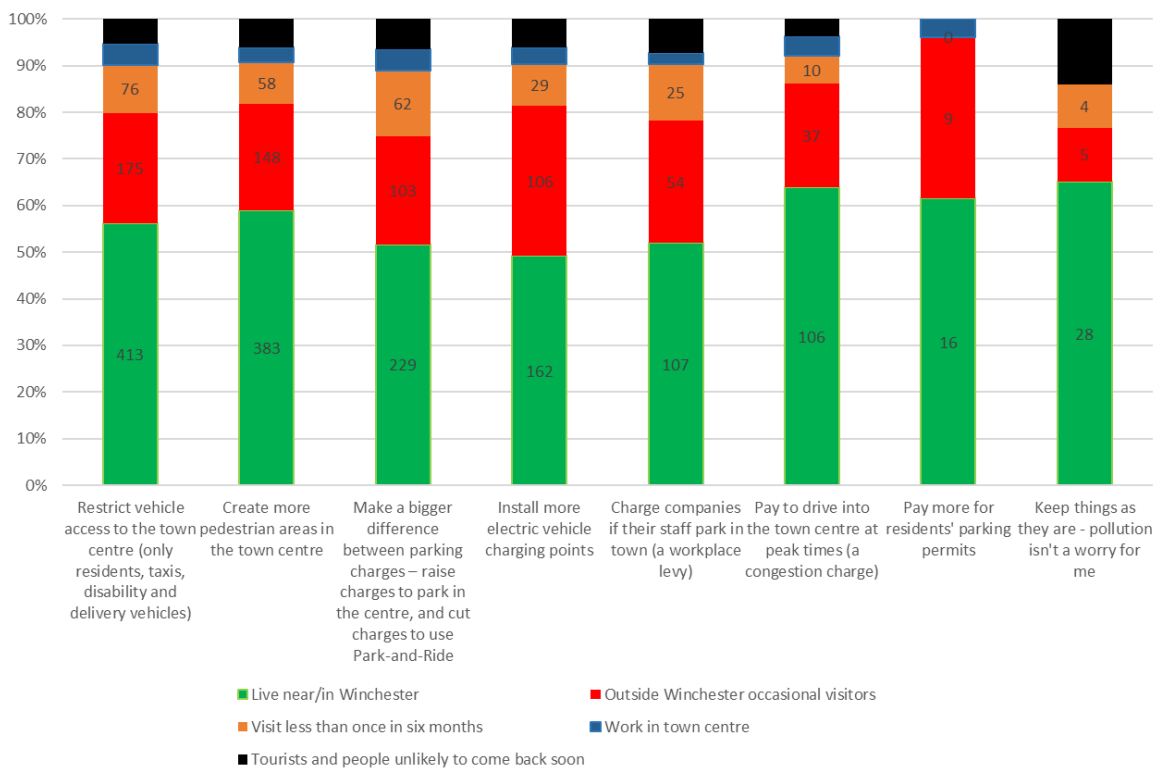
Ways of tackling pollution: how people voted

2 Oct 2016, 26 Nov 2016, 2 Jul 2017

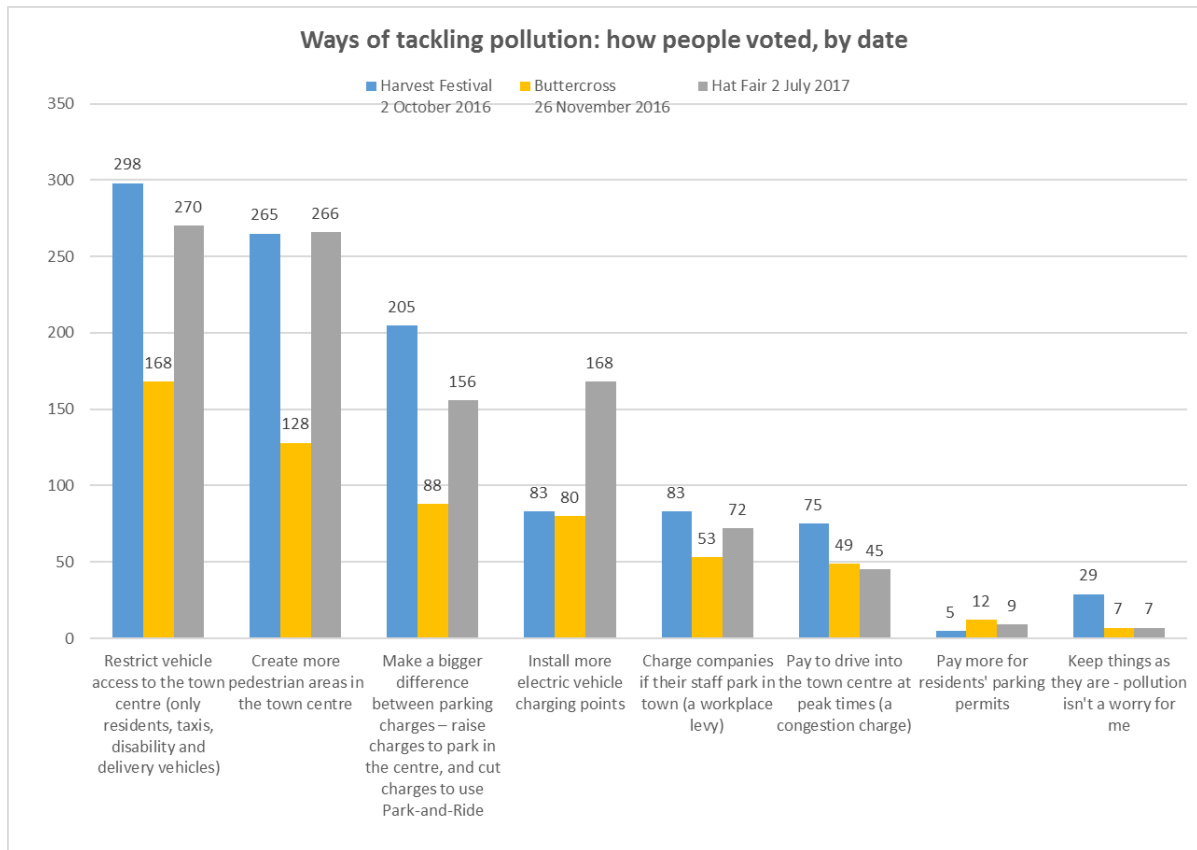


Who voted for what?

There was considerable consistency on all three dates. The main difference was that on 2 July 2017 a greater proportion of votes were cast for more charging points. There was still support in July 2017 for increasing parking differentials, though the council had just done this.
